## Sweetheart Bodice Sew along by Chelsea Bootsman

 Cut out your pieces, using the printed pattern. Make sure you mark the top, bottom and sides, on each panel.

 Pin the side panels to the center front panel, with the right sides of the fabric facing together. Here, I'm using the same fabric for both the lining and the fashion front.

Stitch or serge the bust lines that you've pinned.

Here's how it should look.

 Here's a better angle...(I'm just going to leave this here, because I'm too lazy to take it out and rearrange the rest of the photos).

Press the bust seams on a tailors ham, or something similar.

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Instructions

- Lay the lining on top of the fashion panel (or vice versa), with the right sides facing together, and pin along the top.
- Stitch or serge the top.

 I missed some photos before this step, but basically, after I serged along the top, I opened up my bodice, and then under-stitched on the lining side of the bodice (catching the seam allowance as I stitched).

• Press the top of the bodice, on the lining side. The under-stitching along the top will naturally "curl" the top seam in toward the lining.

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- Open up the front panel and lay the back panel on top, with the right sides facing together.
- Line the side of the back panel up with the side of the front panel and pin them together.
- Stitch or serge the side.
- Do the same with the other side.



Here's how it should look.

- Fold everything in half with the right sided facing out, and press your bodice once more, for good measure.
- Now, you can attach your bodice to a skirt, or add a band to the bottom to make it a crop top.
- You're all finished!!

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
